

About this PDF edition of Let's Eat

Let's Eat was written and published in Laos by Big Brother Mouse as part of our work to make literacy <u>fun</u>. Mr. Bounyang Wuttisakdy selected striking photographs from Wikimedia.org to illustrate 16 Lao words that describe eating and drinking. We added English to make the book useful for Lao speakers learning English, and for non-Lao speakers.

We invite publishers and reading projects in other countries to make use of this work. This PDF is simply to show you what the Lao book looks like; you will need to create a new text and layout using your own systems.

You can adapt the book to your needs:

- * Use the same pictures and translate the English into your language; or use several languages, including or not including English.
- * You can add, remove, or change pictures, perhaps using photographs from your country.

Inside front cover: Photographs of children happily reading. When we first go to a rural school, most children have never seen other children reading for pleasure. We think these photos can pass along that sense of excitement, and encourage more reading.

Inside back cover (this page): Copyright and publisher information, and a thank-you to the book's sponsor. This should also include the Creative Commons information.

Back cover: We usually put some short text, to create excitement about what's in the book, along with a picture. It could also be used for a longer message to parents, teachers, and others, about the importance of reading. In the white box, we put publisher information: Our name, book ISBN, price, and so on.
